A BANGOR WILL CASE

In the High Court of Justice (Chancery Division), before Mr Justice Stirling, on Tuesday, a novel point was raised in connection with the meaning of certain words in a will, the construction of which practically determined who was the owner of an estate valued at nearly £100 per annum.

Mr Evan Roberts, of Canister Coch, Penygroes, in the parish of Llanilyni, issued an originating summons for the construction by the Court of the will of the late Robert Roberts, of Ty'nyffordd, Bangor, which was proved in the District Registry at Bangor on April 21st, 1863. The devise contained in the will upon which the Court was asked to give its construction was as follows:—"I give, devise, and bequeath unto my sons, Evan and William, their heirs and successors, my three houses and premises called Friars-terrace, and cottage called Turupike, all in the city of Bangor, in trust and for the use and benefit of my daughter Ellen, and from and after the decease of my said daughter Ellen to her children, share and share alike, as tenants in common, and not as joint tenants, and if my said daughter Ellen dies without leaving legal issue then to her husband, Richard Griffith, for the term of his natural life, and after his decease to my sons Evan, Robert, and William."

At the time of the testator's death, in 1863, the daughter Ellen and her husband Richard Griffith had no issue, but in 1864 a son was born, and named John Richard Griffith. The latter died before his mother in 1893, when he was 19 years of age. This son was the only issue of the marriage, and the father died shortly afterwards, leaving Mrs Griffith surviving. She died in January last.

It was contended by the plaintiff, Evan Roberts, and the executor of Robert and William Roberts, his brothers, that the said Ellen Griffith had died without leaving legal issue, her son having died in her lifetime, and that consequently they were entitled to the property.

It was maintained on behalf of the defendant, Edward Griffith, of Bryndinas, Upper Bangor, that upon the death of Ellen's child, John Robert Griffith, as Mrs Griffith did not die without leaving legal issue the property would devolve to the father of her child and his heirs. The father was dead, and the defendant, Edward Griffith, was his heir-at-law.

The Court upheld the view contended on behalf of the defendant, and gave the trustee only his costs out of the estate.

The costs of the other claimants were disallowed.

The effect of this order is that the property now vests in the defendant absolutely. Its annual rental is about £100.

The plaintiffs were represented by Messrs Lloyd George and George whilst Mr J. Bryn Roberts, M.P. (instructed by Mr Richard Roberts, Carnarvon), represented the defendant.
